Sunday Reflection by David Franks

I will not leave you orphans

It is hard to imagine the closeness of the relationship between Jesus and His disciples. His ministry was for a short time, possibly three years, and the pace must have been unrelenting, breathtaking. They came from various walks of life, some were fishermen like Peter and Andrew, working men, more used to catching fish than saving souls. Some were unlikely companions like Matthew the tax collector, some are just names who seldom speak, Bartholomew, Thomas and Phillip. There are a group of women who followed Our Lord faithfully, Mary of Magdala. Salome and Mary, the mother of James and Joseph, and many others. Each member of the group had been called to follow by Jesus, and in the following, they became part of a body of faith.

Jesus sees every incident, every time of healing, of teaching, as an opportunity to enter deeply into the lives of His followers and inspire them. Now comes the difficult part, He is aware of the aspirations of those who follow Him. Although He keeps reminding them of his impending sacrifice they follow in hope of a brighter future, a future of freedom from the yoke of oppression. John's discourse to the disciples is full of love; Jesus sees the need in each of them, he knows that the triumph to come is not an earthly victory but a victory that will live forever in the hearts of those who follow him, now, and in the tomorrows to come.

His promise, "I will not leave you orphans" and his gift of the "Spirit of Truth" will lead them to greater deeds than they ever thought possible. He is with them, in them, as He is with, and in, all those who follow Him down the long years to today and the present moment.

Lord, let me walk with you down the dusty roads of Galilee.

May I be present as you heal the leper, teach those who have gone astray and forgive those who have sinned Inspire me to live my life today in your footsteps and remind me that you are always close by and your spirit ever present guiding my steps all I need to do is to listen to your voice within me Amen

Volunteers in readiness for Church re-opening

Though we have no information yet we continue to pray for the day when we can begin to open churches, visit our Blessed Lord and gather for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

When that happens, it will probably be a gradual process. It will involve social distancing and other precautions.

We will need people to help as marshals and ushers encouraging people to observe social distancing and ensuring that safeguards are followed. Though nothing is certain yet if you are willing to help could you kindly email the parish office (office@sbsj.org.uk).

For your own safety you must not have any underlying health problems or be of an age where self-isolation is recommended. The diocese has stated that all volunteers will need to be safely recruited following diocesan safeguarding procedures.

St Brendan 16th May



Born possibly in Tralee, Ireland, and educated by St. Ita and ordained by Bishop Erc, he became a monk and founded a large monastery at Clonfert. Many fantastic details have been added to this brief knowledge usually based on the fictional "Navigation" in which he is described as searching for the Isles of the Blessed, touching the Canaries, and even discovering America. It is possible that he actually made visits to Scotland and Wales. Feast day May 16. He travelled to

Wales and Iona. In 563 he established the monastery of Clonfert where he is buried.

ASCENSION THURSDAY

In the Nicene Creed, we profess out belief in Jesus' Ascension when we say: "He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father."

The Ascension is a mystery of faith, just like Jesus' Resurrection, with which it is closely associated. The event is mentioned briefly by the Evangelist Mark (16:19) and Luke (24:50-53). A more detailed account is given by Luke in the Acts of the Apostles (1:1-12).

The Ascension of Jesus can be defined as the transfer of his risen, glorious body to heaven, that is, to the world of the divine. In the Old Testament, God is described in some texts as "descending" from heaven to accomplish something on earth; he then "ascends" or returns to the world of the divine. Jesus himself speaks of descending to this earth and ascending again to the Father once his work of redemption has been accomplished (cf. Jn 3:13, Eph 4:10).

There are enough indications in the Gospel accounts of the appearances of Jesus to support the belief that he was already in the glory of the Father when he appeared to his followers. But there was a period of instruction after the Resurrection during which Jesus gave his Apostles their final preparation before going out to bear witness to him to the ends of the earth. So, it is commonly held that the Ascension means the final appearance of Jesus to his Apostles before his definitive departure for heaven.

The Ascension means that Jesus, triumphant over death, has begun a new life with God. He has gone to heaven to prepare a place for the elect. On the Last Day, he will return to lead them there so that they might take up their abode with

him (Jn 14:2 ff.). For this reason, the Ascension is a source of great hope and consolation for Christians.
