Jerimiah 20: 10-13 Psalm 68 Romans 5: 12-15 Matthew 10; 26-33

Do not be afraid

A phrase I hear frequently, especially when the word "ministry" is mentioned, is "I am not worthy". I would not belittle this response, it is something that occurs to me often, especially when I am asked to do something, whether it be a new thing or something I have done before. I often think "I am not worthy". A priest friend once said "Who is worthy; if I wanted someone worthy, I would never ask anyone, who judges, not I, I don't think I am worthy myself, just willing to take a chance on God". We are empty vessels, hoping that we are filled with God's love, who try, each in their own way, to do what we can and hope that our efforts are worthy of God's smile.

Jeremiah in our first reading is frightened, he has been elevated to a position in society, a prophet called to do God's work, yet he feels surrounded on all sides by those who wish to bring him down. Even his friends have turned away, lie waiting for his downfall. So, he

calls on the Lord, his mighty hero, not for unstinting support, but for justice, and he does not call in vain. Grace is given so that we, despite our faults may call on the Lord when our sin seems to engulf us. Paul writes to the Romans, he does not deny sin, he has no doubt that sin exists and leads us to death but he too knows that God is there for us, waiting with the abundant free gift of divine grace.

Jesus speaks to the apostles of how, what is now hidden will be revealed and made clear, and how, eventually, we may proclaim it from the rooftops. He holds out to us a future free from the condemnation of those to whom this world belongs: he calls on us not to be afraid for our heavenly Father holds us in the palm of His hands. We should never be afraid when we are called to do some work for Him. Never believe that we are unworthy because God sees us with the eyes of love and knows what we are capable of. When we take up a ministry or begin some work for God then we are declaring that we stand with Jesus, that we are one of his sparrows, that we are prepared to take flight, in this insecure world, in God's name.
