Feast of Saints Peter and Paul 28th June 2020 Now I know it is all true

We are all fallible; no matter what we attain to, we sometimes fall short, we are both saints and sinners, this is what makes us wholly human. None of us is perfect. Whenever I read about Saint Peter or Saint Paul there is always, in the undertones of the passage, this feeling that no matter how clear the message, the character of these two men shines through. If they were applicants for a job they would end up on the rejected pile, Peter for his gift of clear insight marred by his failure to commitment and Paul for his attitude of rushing ahead with a project no matter what the cost to himself or to others, both are accidents waiting to happen. But this is unfair. They were ordinary men, thrust into an extraordinary role, in a world which was not ready to accept them or the message they were sent to proclaim. They represented a challenge to the ways of the world. It is the same today, the world is not ready to accept the message of Christ but we, inspired by Peter and Paul, must keep proclaiming the Gospel, the Good News, of God's love for all creatures that exist.

Peter in our first reading is in prison. His preaching has reached the ears of Herod and the unrest he is creating against the established order is irritating the Rulers and the priestly hierarchy of Israel. As with all those whose message is contrary to the ruling elite he must be suppressed and cast out of society. Christ's message of love is a threat and the only cure is to cut it off at the head. But Peter has an even greater mission than preaching to the Jews, he is given the task of going out to all nations and bringing them into the church of Christ and so. in an instance, all is changed, an angel leads him from his cell into the world, free from his captivity and ready to undertake the task for which he was chosen, deep in his heart, he realises "Now I know it is all true"

Paul. tired through all his trials and weary from his constant travelling is ready for the end. He has run the race and he, too, knows that God has stood by him. He has no regrets, he is leaving the world to his people, those he has formed in the Lord. We all work in the Lord's vineyard, trying our best to make the way of the Lord. We can only achieve the task we are called to, and if we are asked in whose name, we do these things we must stand with Peter and proclaim "For Christ, the Son of the living God".
