1 August 2021 Eighteenth Week in Ordinary Time



Bread is a basic commodity, one of the building bricks of life; without bread or its equivalent most people in our world would die of starvation. It is essential to life itself. However, bread also has another meaning, one of a deeply spiritual significance and this is the theme of today's readings. When you consider the basic needs of people on earth you go beyond food and water, you go to the very depth of our human existence. We need a way of living through which all members of the human race can live in dignity and security. Our readings today move from the desert wanderings of the people of God, through the pastoral letter of Paul to the Ephesians and then, a Gospel passage from John, which reveals the true meaning of the bread. Through these words runs a stream of ideas which help us to come to a real understanding of the purpose of our existence on earth.

Food is hard to find in the desert, it is a barren place with hot days and cold nights, the desert saps your strength, you exist from water hole to water hole, your very existence is based on finding food where there is none. The Israelites are caught between slavery and freedom. They begin to see their slavery as an acceptable experience because, despite the hardships, they could eat. They turn against God and their leaders Moses and Aaron. God sees their plight and is moved to "Rain down bread from Heaven". Each evening birds come to the camp and also at daybreak, Manna falls as bread from heaven. Thus, God feeds His people in their need, and they begin again their march to freedom.

Paul understands that after Christ there can be no going back to the slavery of sin. This is the way the pagans live not the followers of Christ. He urges the people to listen to the words of Jesus, to give up their old way of life, to change, to "put aside illusory desires". They and we, in our day, are called to life in the Spirit, a new life, a new self, created in God's way and filled with holiness and truth. "What must we do if we are to do the works that God wants" the people are confused, they see a healer, a prophet, a miracle worker, and they have never seen anyone like him before. Jesus sees through their confusion; He understands the human side of their nature. He is aware that meeting their physical needs is not enough, He must touch their hearts with His message. Bread now emerges not as food but as a sign of God's presence in the world. Jesus wants them to follow Him, to keep the commandments of God, He offers himself as this bread of life, this eucharist.
