27 February 2022 Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time



Words are at the centre of today's readings. What we say and how we say it reveals much of our individual character. The passage Ecclesiasticus conveys this message in a way that touches something in our spirit. It speaks of the importance of the way a person speaks. Words should be sieved to take out the rubbish, one's worth can be measured by the fruits of his conversation, by the way we speak, we will be judged.

Paul introduces a different topic, death, but in the eloquence of his words we can both measure the man and his message. There is no need to be frightened of death; a good life leads to immortality, a life lived in the spirit of Christ leads to imperishability. Jesus defeated death by His resurrection, this opened for us the promise of eternal life. We must never give up, never admit defeat; the prize is there to be won and doing the Lord's work will lead us to our heavenly home.

In the parables spoken by Our Lord we can see themes that we, as hearers of the Word, should reflect upon. The blind leading the blind is a familiar saying. In a modern context it generally means that one person leads another into a situation but neither of them has a real concept about where they are going. Usually both end up in trouble. Perhaps Jesus is speaking about the teacher and his disciple who are studying a text, both come to the same conclusion because they approach the text with their eyes closed and fail to see the teaching that is before them. Jesus speaks of the splinter and the plank. How often do we criticise someone but fail to see that we too are guilty of a similar fault? How often is our fault the greater because we speak from ignorance of the situation? We should look for perfection in our own lives, in our words and actions, before condemning others for their faults. The parable of the good fruit and the rotten fruit speaks to what is in our hearts. If we have goodness at the heart of what we do then we will produce good fruit, however, if our actions and words come from a spiteful or wicked thought, then we will produce rotten fruit. We cannot think one way and then act in another. We are either grapes or brambles, our nature depends on what is in our hearts. We may find that we are in the midst of a struggle within ourselves when we react to a situation but if our reaction comes from the goodness in our hearts then we follow in the footsteps of Christ; otherwise, we are doing the devil's work. 

Ash Wednesday

Turn Away From Sin And Be Faithful To The Gospel

"Did you forget to wash your face this morning"?

As someone who doesn't like to draw attention to herself, stares and questions can make Ash Wednesday hard. It is the only day of the year (at least to my knowledge) where people can immediately identify you as Christian on sight. You don't even have to do anything; it is right there, spelled out in black and white, on your forehead.

For the distribution of ashes, the priest has a couple choices, but one option is to remind the people of their call to "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." Jesus asks us to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and to visit the imprisoned (Mt 25:34-46). How can your Lenten sacrifice live out the gospel message?

When I was little, I would give up something that I loved for Jesus, like sweets or, as in the case of one really difficult Lent, fizzy drinks. Making any sacrifice, intending to show your love for God, is a great start, but I encourage you to take it one step further. If you decide to sacrifice your morning coffee, maybe money you would have spent at the coffee shop could go to a local charity that provides winter coats for the homeless. If you've noticed that you being spending a little too much of your Saturday mornings watching television, this Lent might be a wonderful time to volunteer to stock shelves at your local food bank or to serve meals at the soup kitchen. Maybe you could wake up an hour earlier to take a lonely, elderly neighbour to Mass.

This Lent is the perfect time to be a living witness to the gospel, but that witness should continue even after Easter. That does not mean that you should give up coffee for the rest of your life or that you should never spend another Saturday morning watching television, but it does mean that our desire to make sacrifices out of love for Jesus shouldn't end just because Lent does. This Ash Wednesday, I encourage you to think about not just how you can live the gospel during the next forty days, but how can you make it a part of your daily life. Ash Wednesday should not be the only day where people can immediately tell that you are Christian; your actions should make it crystal clear all throughout the year. There is no greater compliment than for people to be able to tell that you belong to Christ. Wear your ashes as a proud witness to your belief in Christ, answer any questions that come, and you just might inspire someone else to start his or her own faith journey.
