

Fourth Sunday in Advent



Isaiah speaks of a sign of God's relationship with His people. He speaks of the patience of God, beset by the cries of a people, living in hope yet impatient for a sign that will show them the extent of God's love for them. Perhaps they were hoping for a message of glory and power, an intervention in their lives that would raise them above all other nations, but instead God's promise is the opposite of their hopes, He promises a child, born of a maiden, a son who is to be called Emmanuel, a sign that God is with us.

Paul was a great believe in people, throughout his ministry he calls on a great number of individuals, male and female, to join him in proclaiming the Good News of Christ. Today we have the beginning of perhaps his greatest epistle, the Letter to the Romans; the stage now moves to the centre of the first century world, to Rome, and the diversity of cultures and beliefs that exist in the city. There are many Christian converts in Rome, drawn from places throughout the empire, divided by their nationality and language but united in their faith in Christ. Paul seeks to unite the people of God so that they can be a sign to the pagans that the love of God is for all people. He calls on them to be saints, united with him in service to God the Father and His Son Jesus Christ.

Matthew's account of the happenings to the families of Mary and Joseph is centered on Joseph, a man of honour, who wants to do what is best in a very awkward situation. He is in a dilemma, he cannot understand what is happening to his beloved Mary, he seeks a way that will do least harm. We know very little about Joseph, but from the scraps of information in the gospels, we can be assured that he was a very devout man, well versed in scripture, ready to do God's will. He sleeps, and, in his dreams, he is visited by an angel of God. This encounter assures him that all that Mary and the scriptures say has come to pass, Mary will have a son, and he will be called Jesus, for he comes, to save his people. *David Frank*
