There is no room in a good field for weeds and rubbish: so in the Kingdom of Heaven, there is no room for 'all things that provoke offences, and all who do evil'. They must be got rid of, for the sake of the good wheat, for the sake of the good subjects of the kingdom. But this weeding out will not take place until harvest time - in case one piece of good wheat is destroyed with the weeds. This shows the mercy of God: everyone has chance after chance to prove that they are wheat, not darnel; there are no quick judgements in the kingdom of heaven, and things are never as black and white as we think. Only at the end of time will evil stand out clearly, so that it can be disposed of, and only the Son of Man can judge.

New Translation of the Roman Missal Outline/Summary of Third Catechesis Session

Liturgy of the Word

- The structure remains the same
- There are four elements
- Readings from Scripture
- Homily
- Creed (Profession of Faith)
- Prayers of the Faithful (Bidding Prayers)

Readings from Scripture

- In due course there is to be a new Lectionary (using the New Revised Standard Version rather than the Jerusalem Bible)
- The selection of readings will remain the same
- There is a 3 year Sunday cycle & 2 year weekday one
- We are exposed to a significant amount of Scripture
- Psalm and Gospel Acclamation should be sung
- Some changes of dialogue (and quiet prayers)
- "And with your spirit"
- "Glory to you, O Lord"
- "The word of the Lord"/"The Gospel of the Lord"
- God's word is alive and active
- God speaks to us here and now in this celebration

Homily

- Normally based on the readings
- Can be on other texts from the Mass
- May also touch on special themes
- Application to daily living

Creed (Profession of Faith)

- Significant changes to the wording of Nicene Creed
- "I believe" (literal translation of "Credo")
- "of all things visible and invisible"
- "I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages...consubstantial with the Father"
- "adored"
- "I confess one baptism..."
- "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead..."
- Apostles' Creed remains an option: few changes of wording but one sentence replaces 8 sentences in the current translation

Prayers of the Faithful

- Most flexible part of the Liturgy (free composition)
- Guidelines for areas to cover: Church, Society, Needy
 & Local Community
